Thank you for your proposal which was received on April 8, 2020 through the generic inbox <a href="mailto:aadnc.skemergency.aandc@canada.ca">aadnc.skemergency.aandc@canada.ca</a>.

Indigenous Services Canada is implementing a Nation-led, phased approach to support communities in accessing a number of COVID-19 response funding streams. Allocations received to date via the Emergency Management Assistance Program (EMAP) and the Indigenous Community Support (ICSF) fund are intended to provide initial funds to support your pandemic response. These initial funding amounts are flexible and can be put towards several aspects of your community's COVID-19 response, including the retrofit and setup of facilities for isolation as well as reimbursement of costs incurred as a result of heightened security measures. Both of these sources of funds can be utilized towards immediate non-health needs related to COVID-19. In the event that EMAP and ICSF resources are not sufficient to support a prolonged COVID response plan, ISC will work with your community to address outstanding requirements.

Saskatchewan Region provided \$8M in resources under the Emergency Management Assistance Program (EMAP) at the end of 2019-20 to ensure the immediate health and safety response of First Nations related to COVID-19. In April, all First Nations received funding through the Indigenous Community Support Fund (ICSF) to address immediate and distinct needs in your communities in relation to COVID-19 priorities and to implement your pandemic plans. The Regional ICSF allocation was \$30.2M. Both of these sources of funds can be utilized towards immediate needs related to Covid-19.

To meet the health needs of First Nations communities, Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) continues to receive requests and respond to emerging needs. Additional health-specific funding is accessible on a needs-basis request, where eligible, and where expenditures to date that have not been covered by the initial funding allocations.

Funding may be utilized to:

- Respond to identified needs to update and/or activate pandemic plans;
- Support public health and primary health care capacity to respond to the COVID-19 outbreak;
- Align response efforts with evidence; and,
- Address immediate needs in the short term.



We respect each First Nations unique situation and their ability to prioritize and respond to their members needs.

We have reviewed your request to access Additional Heath Supports. First Nations and Inuit Health Branch is able to provide \$380,000 through the Community Guide process to support the purchase and distribution of personal protective equipment for non-medical workers including personal support workers in First Nation communities and family members who are caring for individuals and staff in contact with individuals.

A breakdown of funding is explained as follows:

Personal Protective Equipment to distribute to staff and communities - \$380,000.

### Total \$380,000.

This COVID-19 funding support is directed at First Nations communities and organisations to support the implementation of pandemic plans and support Saskatchewan First Nations to provide community-led public health responses to the pandemic including the safe reopening of community schools.

### #1.) Re-Opening First Nation Communities & Administrations:

- First Nation communities shall re-open in a safe manner with the continued widespread use of PPE products utilized by community members and First Nation Band Workers.
- \* It should be noted that while FSIN possesses limited PPE supplies from previously approved projects for the provision of PPE to First Nation communities in general, our organization has received a tremendous influx of requests for PPE from First Nation administered schools. The FSIN has responded by providing upon request from First Nation schools adequate PPE supplies (masks and hand sanitizer). This will create a shortage of PPE products that the FSIN has earmarked for First Nation communities in general.
- \*\* It should be further noted that at the time of this application the province of Saskatchewan including First Nations have experienced consistently low infection rates. With the exception of communal living communities that have recently experienced significant outbreaks, the Saskatchewan Region has maintained these consistently low infection rates due to the use of effective contact tracing, self-quarantining and social distancing and sanitary practices.

Other efforts have included; Effective Communication and Networking, First Nation Border Closures or Restrictions (which has aided in tracing and tracking of infected cases), reinforced of course with the widespread distribution by FSIN of Basic PPE, for use as an essential measure in the fight against the pandemic.

- The FSIN will continue to distribute to all Saskatchewan First Nations a steady supply of PPE products to be used in the fight against the Covid-19 virus. Through this application the FSIN will continue in its current project of providing a steady supply of

Thank you for the **urban/off-reserve** proposal to the Indigenous Community Support Fund (ICSF) Wave 2 Needs-Based process to access additional support for First Nations during COVID-19. Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) continues to work closely with Saskatchewan First Nations, Tribal Councils and Indigenous Organizations to support community-led responses to the pandemic.

On August 12, 2020, Indigenous Services Canada announced \$305 million in additional funding for the ICSF to support Indigenous Peoples during the COVID-19 pandemic. This second wave of the ICSF funding is available to First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities, as well as Indigenous communities and organizations serving Indigenous peoples, including First Nations living on-reserve, off-reserve as well as Indigenous Peoples living in urban centers.

In review of your request, ISC-Saskatchewan Region can confirm approval of \$1,654,775 to support the following activities included in your proposal:

Food Security (including distribution costs): \$1,654,775

Many First Nations in Saskatchewan also requested ICSF support for food security and other supports on-reserve and were funded over \$29 million in ICSF wave 2 proposals directly to support their members on-reserve. Over \$7 million in ICSF wave 2 funding was approved to support members off-reserve in Saskatchewan, including proposals approved for independent First Nations (not members of Tribal Councils) and Tribal Councils (such as Prince Albert Grand Council, Saskatoon Tribal Council, Yorkton Tribal Council, and Battlefords Agency Tribal Council) to support their members off-reserve with food security. Meadow Lake Tribal Council and Metis Nation of Saskatchewan were also supported by the department outside of ICSF wave 2 for their continued partnership in providing supports to the northwest which includes food security for Indigenous people in that area.

The Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations was selected to primarily provide this food security support for other urban areas in Saskatchewan. We do encourage you to work closely with these Tribal Councils should you decide to both support members in the same urban area.

All activities related to the approved project listed above must be completed before March 31, 2021.

In accordance with the Program Guidelines, a Report must be completed using the appropriate template, Data Collection Instrument (DCI) number: 4548549. This report, due **July 29<sup>th</sup>**, **2021**, must include a summary of activities, outcomes, and financial details of the approved projects undertaken.

Project expenditures are to be reported in a separate schedule in your organization's annual financial audit.

This funding is also in addition to the \$6.5M approved on November 25, 2020, for public health measures funding confirmed with you last week to support PPE.

Thank you for your request to the **Indigenous Community Support Fund (ICSF)** Wave 3 Needs-Based process to access additional support for First Nations during COVID-19. Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) continues to work closely with Saskatchewan First Nations, Tribal Councils and Indigenous organizations to support community-led responses to the pandemic.

On August 12, 2020, Indigenous Services Canada announced \$305 million in additional funding for the ICSF to support Indigenous Peoples during the COVID-19 pandemic. This third wave of the ICSF funding is available to First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities, as well as Indigenous communities and organizations serving Indigenous peoples, including First Nations living on-reserve, off-reserve as well as Indigenous Peoples living in urban centers. These funds will provide Indigenous communities and organizations with resources to implement their own solutions, informed by public health guidance, related to the COVID-19 pandemic to safely restart community programs and services. Potential applicants are encouraged to send their proposals in a timely manner, as applications will be assessed for eligibility (as per selection criteria listed on website) and prioritized on a case-by-case basis.



Thank you for submitting the COVID-19 Fourth Wave Needs Based Pandemic Funding Proposal received September 17, 2021 designed to support:

- Purchase, Warehousing, and Distribution of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).
- Communications / Information sharing, Pandemic coordination, and Media relations.
- Covid-19 Vaccination-Strategic Coordination.
- Rapid Testing Kits-Purchase and Deployment.

The Government of Canada recognizes that First Nation, Inuit, and Métis remain among the most at risk and face unique challenges in addressing COVID-19. During the COVID-19 crisis, the health and wellbeing of First Nation, Inuit, and Métis has been and will remain Indigenous Services Canada's primary focus.

Indigenous Services Canada's Saskatchewan Region has reviewed the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations (FSIN) proposal and is supportive of \$484,900 for the following items:

- Communications \$250,000
- Public Health Consultant (October 1, 2021 March 31, 2022) \$55,500
- Special Assistant Coordinator (October 1, 2021 March 31,2022) \$53,500
- Administration costs \$35,900



## Chief's Task Force \$90,000

A Notice of Budget Adjustment (NOBA) totalling \$394,900 from Public Health Measures funding will be added to your existing Contribution Agreement #1516-SK-000112 and a NOBA totalling \$90,000 from the Indigenous Community Support Fund #4 will be added to your existing Contribution Agreement #2021-SK-000068.

As we continue our efforts to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, the health and safety of Canadians remains the government's top priority. Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) in partnership Public Services and Procurement Canada is working to ensure that front-line workers in Indigenous businesses, associations, and organizations have access to the information, resources, and PPE they need to stay safe and healthy.

Essential service businesses and organizations are eligible to receive free PPE, non-medical masks, and disinfection products from the government through Canada's National Emergency Strategic Stockpile (NESS) and Essential Services Contingency Reserve (ESCR). This stockpile of PPE was purchased, authenticated, and is warehoused to ensure adequate supplies are available, at no cost, for all Canadian non-profit organisations. At present, all stockpiles have inventory to meet National demands for adult medical grade masks, isolation gowns, gloves, face shields, procedure masks (adult / pediatric), N95 respirators, and alcohol-based hand sanitizer. ISC encourages the FSIN to access this National stockpike and acknowledges the FSIN's efforts and partnership in supporting the needs of Saskatchewan First Nations. ISC remains supportive of the FSIN's distribution and warehousing of PPE drawn down from the National Stockpile.

However, further to the FSIN's specific request for pediatric medical masks and considering possible National supply chain issues, Regional ISC representatives will continue to work with you to assess this request and determine an allocation based on community transmission in Saskatchewan and the impacted population. This request has been submitted for consideration to the Department under Contingency funding.

ISC acknowledges the FSIN request to purchase Rapid Response (COV-19C25) COVID-19 Antigen Test Devices. Unfortunately, funding cannot be provided for the procurement of these tests because they are available without cost from one of the provincial or federal test access portals, subject to availability and eligibility. ISC is committed to collaborating with the FSIN to determine testing needs and provide testing capacity from available public sources for public health outbreak management and response. The interim distribution plan for rapid antigen tests has been focused on school children ineligible for vaccination as well as congregate living situations including long-term care, personal care homes, shelters, and residential treatment facilities for the purpose of screening and surveillance. To date, 181,700 Rapid Antigen Tests have been distributed to First Nations communities in Saskatchewan with an additional 360,000 Rapid Antigen Tests to be distributed by the end of October. These tests are an important screening tool and ISC will facilitate quick distribution to First Nation



communities The National stockpile for Point of Care Rapid Antigen Tests is available to First Nation communities upon request; kits can be requested by emailing <a href="mailto:sac.testing-skfn.isc@canada.ca">sac.testing-skfn.isc@canada.ca</a>. As the testing landscape is complex and continues to evolve, ISC and NITHA look forward to ongoing discussions and engagement with the Chief's COVID Task Force regarding Public Health advice and to support First Nations decision-making in Saskatchewan.

As the pandemic continues to evolve, ISC is committed to ensuring that First Nations have the tools and supports they need to respond. Thank you for your leadership during these unprecedented times and your commitment to the health and safety of your member communities and citizens.

Please continue to work with the Region on the COVID-19 reponse and engage Regional Executive Officer, Jocelyn Andrews, and Regional Director General, Rob Harvey.



- personal protective equipment, signage and equipment
- warehousing rental and insurance.
- warehouse staffing
- distribution of supplies
- vehicle and fuel expenses
- vaccine oversight
- HEPA filters
- communications, advertising and media

As we continue our efforts to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, the health and safety of Canadians remains the government's top priority. Indigenous Services Canada in partnership with Public Services and Procurement Canada is working to ensure that Canadians, especially Indigenous youth and teaching staff in Indigenous communities have access to the information, resources and personal protective equipment supplies they need to stay safe and healthy.

Indigenous Services Canada continues to facilitate access to personal protective equipment and the Saskatchewan Region monitors these requests through an intake process through the following email address: aandc.skemergency.aandc@canada.ca. The National Emergency Strategic Stockpile and Essential Services Contingency Reserve, essential service businesses and organizations are eligible to receive free personal protective equipment, non-medical masks and disinfection products from the government. This stockpile of personal protective equipment was purchased, authenticated, and is in warehouse to ensure adequate supplies are available, at no cost, to all Canadian non-profit organisations. At present, all stockpiles have adequate inventory levels to meet national demands for adult medical grade masks, isolation gowns, gloves, face shields, procedure masks (adult / pediatric) N95 respirators and alcohol-based hand sanitizer. Indigenous Services Canada acknowledges your continued leadership and ability to distribute 1,000,000 additional Kn95 respirators from the Essential Services Contingency Reserve stockpile and the recent agreement signed between the parties on January 11, 2022. However we understand that there is some uncertainty with the supply chain specific to pediatric N95 masks. Given this, support for the continued distribution and warehousing of personal protective equipment and the direct procurement of five months supply through to the end of the 2021-2022 school year is approved. Regional Indigenous Services Canada representatives will continue to work with you to assess ongoing needs.

Indigenous Services Canada also appreciates the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations' willingness to procure and distribute HEPA filters to all of Saskatchewan's First Nation communities to support their schools. This is an eligible expense under the current needs based COVID 19 Public Health Measures funding, however Indigenous Services Canada will continue to work directly with regional education and health system partners to ensure that communities can access this support.

The Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations' continued communication and information sharing with all levels of government in pandemic coordination and a focus on media relations, has also been reviewed and was previously approved till the end of the fiscal year as part of the June 25, 2021, and September 17, 2021 COVID 19 proposals. We remain open to further discussion on this request as the Department awaits future funding authorities to be in place for the new fiscal year.

As the pandemic continues to evolve, Indigenous Services Canada is committed to working with the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations' and all First Nations across the country to ensure they have the tools and supports they need to respond. We are pleased to confirm immediate funding for the items identified in this letter, and we remain committed to working with you on other needs going forward, including on the issue of ventilation in schools.

Thank you for your leadership during these unprecedented times and your commitment to the health and safety of your community and citizens.
